# Society's Annual Meeting Earlier in 2024!

Through the gracious generosity of Dr. Mark Livengood, Director of the Mid-Continent Public Library's Story Center, the Missouri Folklore Society will gather at the beautiful Woodneath Library Center (images and description of the magnificent facility in pages following). Available dates compel us to meet earlier than usual, but on the same Thursday-Saturday schedule — please mark your calendars for October 17 through 19.

Conference organizers Lyn Wolz, Susan Bryson and Ginger Hendrickson are currently planning events, activities and speakers, but now is the time for you to be thinking about your own contribution — as always, the society welcomes scholars and tradition-bearers, amateurs and enthusiasts, with a special welcome for young folk and students. We have a special fondness for and focus on the lore of our fair state, but we are open to presentations and sharing of folk-lore, folkways in the broadest sense, as our 1906 mission statement declared — from any-where and any time. There will be scholarly and creative work, performances and demonstrations, panels and discussions, sharing and remembering and storytelling — as well there should be, in this special venue.

Teachers are especially asked to encourage their students to think about sharing their own work: we sorely need to raise up a new generation of folklorists. All student presenters have their registration fee waived and receive a year's free membership.

• Friendly Bean coffee shop inside the branch library. We often contract with them to provide coffee and cookies for our programs.



Ginger is working on a speaker focused on westward migration and diverse communities. The author of the new book on Vance Randolph is a possibility.





### Announcing the Forthcoming Publication of Men of No Reputation

Jul 19, 2023 | Arkansas and the Region, Forthcoming Books, Ozarks, Ozarks Studies, regional history



The University of Arkansas Press is proud to announce the forthcoming publication of *Men of No Reputation: Robert Boatright, the Buckfoot Gang, and the Fleecing of Middle America* by Kimberly Harper.

Men of No Reputation: Robert Boatright, the Buckfoot Gang, and the Fleecing of Middle America is the first account to explore the life of Robert Boatright, one of the Midwest's most gifted—but forgotten confidence men. Boatright's story provides a rare window into the secret world of Missouri's criminal past, one that influenced the methods of confidence men across the country. Boatright took the preexisting big store confidence scheme and perfected it. With the assistance of a talented coterie of confederates known as the Buckfoot Gang, he fleeced the gentry of the Midwest on fixed athletic contests in the turn-of-the-century Ozarks, leading one scholar to call him "the dean of modern confidence men." Working in concert with a local bank and an influential Democratic boss, Boatright seemed untouchable. A series of missteps, however, led to a string of court cases across the country that brought his criminal enterprise to an end. And yet, the con continued. Boatright's successor John C. Mabray and his gang, many of whom had been in the Buckfoot Gang, preyed upon victims across North America in one of the largest Midwestern criminal syndicates in history before they were brought to heel. Like the works of Sinclair Lewis, Boatright's story exposes a rift in the wholesome Midwestern stereotype and furthers our understanding of nineteenth- and twentieth- century American society.

A seventh-generation Ozarker, Kimberly Harper earned a master's degree in history from the University of Arkansas. She received the Missouri Humanities Council's Distinguished Achievement in Literature (Non-Fiction) Award for her book *White Man's Heaven: The Lynching and Expulsion of Blacks in the Southern Ozarks*, 1894-1909.

*Men of No Reputation* will be published in February 2024. It is part of the Ozarks Studies series, edited by Brooks Blevins. The Ozarks Studies series acknowledges the awakening of a scholarly Ozarks studies movement—one that crosses disciplinary boundaries as it approaches regional study from a variety of vantage points—and positions the University of Arkansas Press as the publisher at the forefront of the movement. As the only university press headquartered within the Ozarks region and as a press with a solid background in the publication of books on the region—Rafferty's *The Ozarks, Land and Life,* Morrow's *Shepherd of the Hills Country,* Harper's *White Man's Heaven,* Sizemore's *Ozark Vernacular Houses,* and many more—the University of Arkansas Press is ideally suited for the first series that will level a scholarly eye on the Ozarks and Ozarkers.
